Spinal Muscular Atrophy Awareness Month

Spinal Muscular Atrophy Awareness is each year in August. It is a hereditary neurological disease that inhabits voluntary muscle action, leading to gradual muscular weakness and atrophy. It is a condition in which the spinal cord does not form normally. This neural tube develops into the baby's brain, spinal cord and the tissues that surround it. Spinal Muscular atrophy does not cause any impairments and does not manifest until later in life.

Nerve cells in the spinal cord called motor neurons waste away and this is what causes spinal muscular atrophy. It is the main cause of death in babies under the age of 2 and the main feature is gradual paralysis of voluntary muscles, with the arm, leg and respiratory muscles being affected the most. Poor head control, swallowing difficulties, scoliosis and joint problems are all possible complications.

All levels of this nerve disease necessitate varying degrees of treatment, which usually entails a combination of prescription, technology and psychotherapy. With proper treatment, many children and adults with this disease can lead full, productive lives.

History

- *The first case was discovered in 1891 when Guido Werdnig discovered spinal muscular atrophy in two baby brothers
- *In 1899, Sylvestre became the first to describe severe infantile Spinal Muscular Atrophy
- *In 2009, surgeons begin using the vertebral body for surgery
- *In 2011, people who wear the scoliosis bodysuit are subjected to research

We are also pleased to announce that the momentum refresh, a universal changing station, designed for individuals with disabilities, will be available at the fairgrounds for two days this year thanks to funding secured through the HCBS ARPA Grant.

This innovative vehicle is designed to provide convenience, accessibility and dignity for individuals with limited mobility, or those in need of assistance with personal hygiene. This vehicle, equipped with a toilet, sink, changing

table, a Hoyer lift and privacy is perfect for those who may need this type of assistance while at the fair. Momentum refresh will provide a comfortable and convenient experience for individuals with disabilities and families with small children.

You can visit the momentum refresh on August 13 for Senior, Veteran and DD day and August 14 for kid's day. Look for a bright and colorful vehicle on the south side of the fairgrounds. The mobile changing unit will be set up and staffed on the southside of the fairgrounds next to the pavilion and veteran's tent from 9:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. each day.

Hello! For this month's restaurant review, I chose the Firepit Grill in Holland, located at 7723 Airport Highway. My family started our meal with an order of Dixie egg rolls, served with South Carolina style honey mustard dipping sauce. The egg rolls were stuffed with BBQ pork and cabbage. Everyone at the table loved the flavor of the egg rolls. For my dinner, I ordered street tacos. The 3 tacos in my order were filled with pork and topped with coleslaw, pineapple and pickled onions -a great combination of flavors. My Mom ordered a BBQ chicken pizza, a new addition to their menu. My mom's pizza was a flavorful thin crust pizza and was easily enough for 2 or 3 people! My Dad ordered chicken wings, and he was impressed with the serving size of the chicken wings. He liked the smokey flavor of the chicken. My brother ordered BBQ chicken which was served with 2 sides. He liked the juicy smoked chicken and rated his BBQ chicken 5 stars out of 5. The rest of us gave our meals 4.5 stars out of 5.

The Fire Pit Grill has a nice covered outdoor patio. The patio has a very cool fire pit with plenty of chairs to sit and relax around the fire. Firepit Grill serves a Sunday brunch each weekend, which features amazing breakfast and lunch favorites. The brunch is a great choice for a special occasion.



We had over 40 athletes, coaches, staff, and family members travel to OSU to spend the weekend and compete at state level in powerlifting, traditional volleyball, bocce, and track/field events. We had a blast as always. It's super warm every year. One of the highlights of our weekend was getting to have opening ceremonies at the OSU Football stadium. It was so neat to sit on the 50-yard line where so many great players have run.

But we were also honored to have one of our Athlete Leaders, Lydia Knepper lead the Athlete Oath for the 3,000 athletes that were competing. We also had two of our athletes receive Distinguished Athlete Awards from Special Olympics Ohio. Linda Baser in cheerleading, and Terri Jo Stover in Equestrian. Distinguished Athlete awards are only

handed out every 4 years and are given to the oldest active athletes in each sport we offer in Ohio.



EARLY INTERVENTION (EI) AT A GLANCE



Welcome to EI

- Referral is received.
- Early Intervention Service Coordinator (EISC) is assigned.
- EISC contacts parent and schedules first visit.

EISC First Visit

- EISC explains program.
- EISC informs family of rights in EI.
- EISC gathers background info.
- EISC obtains consents to begin.

Eligibility Determined

Diagnosed condition that could cause delay(s) in development or confirmed delay(s) in development

Individualized Family Service Plan Meeting (IFSP)

- Family identifies desired outcomes.
- Plan is developed.
- Early Intervention services are determined.

Child & Family- Directed Assessments

- Identifies family resources, priorities, and concerns.
- Identifies child's strengths, routines, and needs.

Early Intervention Services

- · Occur in natural settings.
- · Are scheduled to fit family needs.
- PSP supports caregivers to enhance child participation in daily routines.

EI Team Review

- IFSP is reviewed at 6 months (or upon request) to update outcomes or services.
- Annual IFSP review.

Transition from EI

- IFSP transition plan is developed and transition options are explored.
- TPC is held, with consent.
- Transition from EI by age 3.

Early Intervention Referrals

Making a referral for Hope's Early Intervention services is the first step for parents and caregivers who have questions or concerns about their infant or child. One referral opens the door to many programs that support families.

HOPE Services offers Early Intervention to infants and toddlers who have an eligible medical diagnosis or a delay in development from birth until the child turns 3 years old. Examples of reasons to refer can include tasks such as feeding concerns, not being able to roll, sit, crawl or delayed walking, difficulty engaging with other people, being overly active and difficult to parent, and not using sounds or words typical of a child that age.

There is no direct cost to a family for any Early Intervention Service that is offered. The services include but are not limited to screenings, evaluations, recommendations and referrals to other agencies for services, Service Coordination, Developmental Specialists, Occupational Therapy, Speech Therapy, Physical Therapy, Mental Health, Vision, and Hearing Consultants. Early Intervention services builds up and supports families an caregivers in locating resources and working directly with them to enhance the learning and development of skills.
