Looking back on the past year, the Henry County Board of Developmental Disabilities is thrilled to celebrate the milestones achieved through the hard work and dedication of our board, staff, and community partners. Our collective efforts have resulted in significant advancements in improving the lives of individuals with disabilities.

We are proud to share that we received a three-year accreditation from the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities, recognizing our ongoing commitment to upholding high standards in the services and supports we offer. This accreditation is a testament to the unwavering dedication of our teams who strive daily to fulfill our mission of promoting happy and fulfilling lives for those we serve.

Our partnerships within the community have been a key driver of success this past year. Our collaboration with the Henry County Fair Board, granted the introduction of the Momentum Refresh vehicle at the fair, equipped with a universal, adult changing table and the installation of a viewing platform offering individuals with disabilities more options for community involvement. The River City Bowl-A-Way was able to install ramps to enter the building making a community event more accessible. Several parks have installed accessible park equipment for community use.

Additionally, our focus on assistive technology has led to the creation of an assistive technology resource and lending library at HOPE Services. We have also started driving classes with our on-site driving simulator. This will provide hands-on experiences for individuals to explore various options for increasing their independence.

The support from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding has been instrumental in driving these inclusive initiatives forward.

We are grateful for the commitment and passion of our team and look forward to another year of growth and impact in serving individuals with developmental disabilities in Henry County.



### 16 Gestures by 16 months

Research shows the development of gestures predicts language skills 2 years later. Children should be using at least 2 new gestures each month from 9 to 16 months. By 16 months, children should have at least 16 gestures.

9 months: Give, shake head

10 months: Reach, raise arms

11 months: Show, Wave

12 months: Open hand, point, tap

13 months: Clap, blow a kiss

14 months: Index finger point, Shhh gesture

15 months: Head nod, thumbs up, hand up

**16 months:** Other symbolic gestures (I don't

know, where is it?)



players up to the age of 21, an all-ladies team which picks up at 18/19 through adulthood, and two divisions of men's teams. The Special Olympics gives us the freedom to division our players according to their skill and abilities levels. That doesn't mean that you will always be on that team, but as your skills improve, players can move between levels. Our teams do change year to year depending on who is moving up to



a different team. This is something that we reassess on an ongoing basis and talk about throughout the season as we make notes of each player. We also watch players between basketball seasons and assess at the start of the next season to see what team they will be on.

Our Esports team attended the Def-Com 9 put on by Defiance Public Library. It was a fun day, with many of them dressing up as their favorite anime or movie characters. They made some new friends, played games, and even got to see a great presentation by Nature's Nursery. Our esports team is in need right now. We are looking for new series Xbox game systems, Nintendo Switch game systems, and even laptops that are capable of gaming. Our team has grown, and we currently have outgrown our equipment needs. 





Seasonal Affective Disorder, or SAD is a type of depression that start in the late fall or early winter and go away during the spring or summer, known as winter-pattern SAD or winter depression. Other people experience depressive symptoms during the spring and summer months, known as summer-pattern SAD or summer depression. Summer-pattern SAD is less common.

Studies indicate that people with SAD, especially winter pattern sad, have reduced levels of the brain chemical serotonin, which helps regulate mood. Research also suggests that sunlight affects levels of molecules that help maintain normal serotonin levels. Shorter daylight hours may prevent these molecules from functioning properly, contributing to decreased serotonin levels in the winter.

Vitamin D deficiency may exacerbate these problems in people with winter-pattern SAD because vitamin D is believed to promote serotonin activity. In addition to vitamin D consumed in food, the body produces vitamin D when exposed to the skin. With less daylight in the winter, people with SAD may have lower vitamin D levels, further reducing serotonin activity.
